# READING ACTIVITIES

Choose one of the projects for the book you read.

## Entering 6th & 7th grade


- Create a mini-comic book relating several chapters of the book. Include setting, characters, theme, and conflict/climax. Include the name of the book and the author on the cover.
- Create a board game based on the book (complete with game board, game pieces, and rules- put in a container such as a decorated pizza box). In some way, include the setting, characters, theme, and conflict. Include the name of the book and the author.
- Create a song or rap based on the book. Include at least two of the four elements of a story (setting, characters, theme, and conflict).
- Decorate a t-shirt that includes the book title and author. You may want to include setting, characters, theme, and/or conflict. Come up with a slogan or line from the book that is relevant and include it on the shirt.
- Wrap Up with a Good Book- Decorate the outside of a box to show knowledge of the book. Include setting, characters, theme, and conflict. Use your imagination and any materials you choose.
- Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words you find in your novel. Create a chart/poster to help others to understand and learn the word meanings from your novel. Use at least 10 words from the novel that would be considered challenge words for your grade level.

## **Entering 8th Grade**

- Make a character wheel of your favorite character in the story. Include his or her traits/qualities. How does he or she act towards the other characters? What does he or she say to the others? Include at least 6 things about the character. Make it legible and colorful.
- Make a story board of the main events in the novel.
   Color and details count! You must have at least five
   (5) frames.
- Write a review of your novel to advertise for a book company to sell this book. Include a brief summary of the novel and what impact it had on your life or the lives of those who will want to read it. SELL IT IN WORDS!
- Write arguments to support claims with clear reasons and relevant evidence about your novel that defend why it is one of the best books you have read.
- Determine or clarify the meaning of unknown and multiple-meaning words you find in your novel. Create a chart/poster to help others to understand and learn the word meanings from your novel. Use at least 10 words from the novel that would be considered challenge words for your grade level.
- Create a literary analysis with the following questions. What is the setting of the novel? What is the main conflict in the novel? Be specific. Who is the main character? Describe him or her with details found in the novel. Would you want to be friends with this person? Why or why not? EXPLAIN. Tell about the five (5) most important MAIN EVENTS in this novel? How is the main conflict resolved? Explain. Rate this novel on a scale of one to five. Tell why you chose that rating. Who would enjoy reading this book? Why? What was your favorite part of the novel and why?

For each of the questions, there should be a full paragraph that answers the question in clear detail with correct conventions (capitalization, punctuation, grammar, complete sentences, and clearness in writing.)

All students entering a Middle School grade will be turning in a project for their book.

# Civics Academic Enrichment Activity for Incoming 7th Graders

All incoming 7th graders will be taking civics. At the end of the year, they will be participating in the state mandated end of course assessment. The test requires a tremendous amount of preparation and the score will be 30% of the final civics grade.
